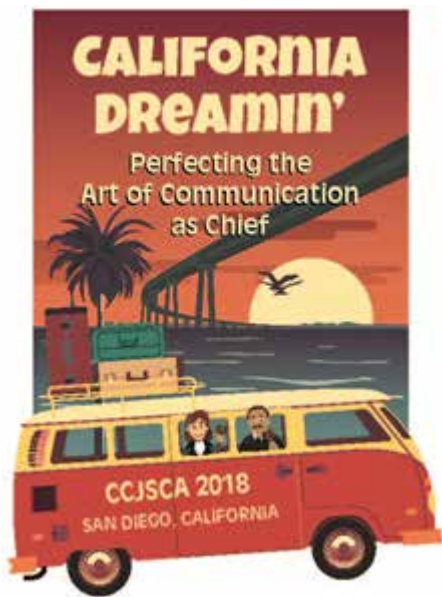

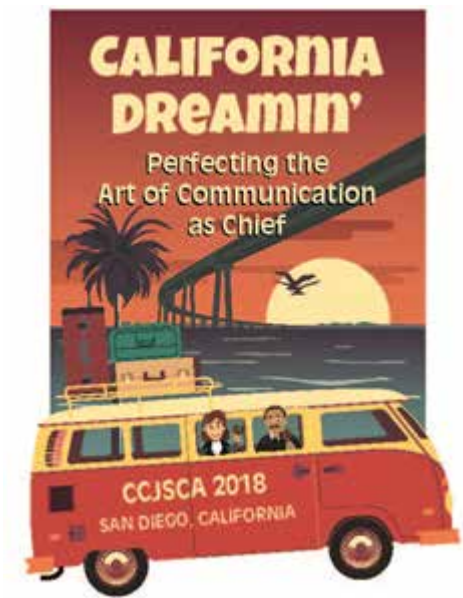

Program Title: “Clear, Concise and Understandable Opinions: The Art of Effective Editing”

<p>Learning Objectives: <i>As a result of this course, participants should be better able to:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Develop appropriate editing methodology when reviewing one’s own work or work by peers or subordinates keeping in mind the ongoing and long-term relationships with the recipient. 2. Examine correct word usage v. style; jargon v. non-legalese; legal terms v. plain English and the proper use of each in opinion writing. 3. Identify punctuation that clarifies the intention of the drafter and minimizes ambiguities in the text so that readers understand the holding. 4. Recognize and select content, text and details that can be omitted as unnecessary given privacy or security concerns (e.g., identities of victims, eyewitnesses, street addresses, or litigation financial information).
