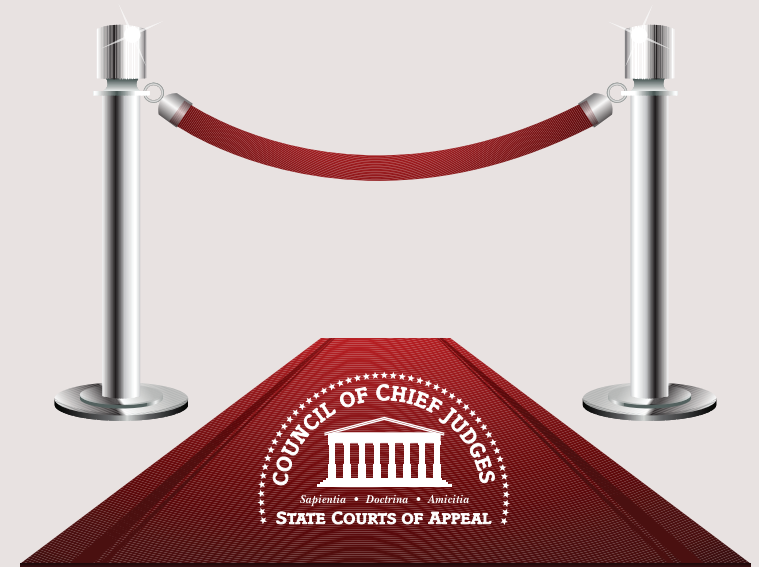

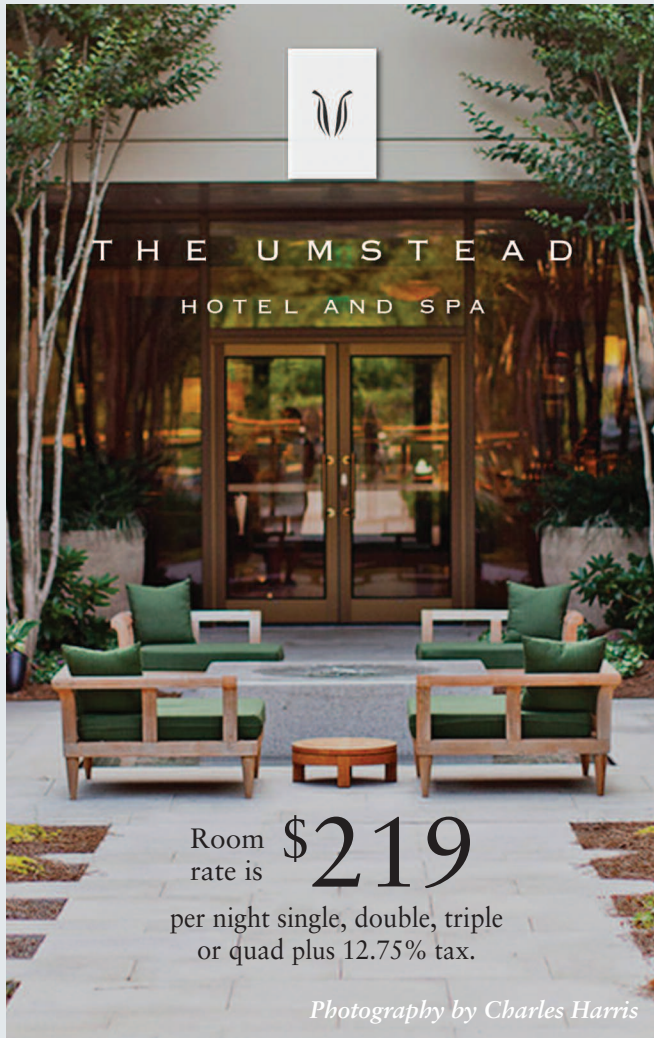

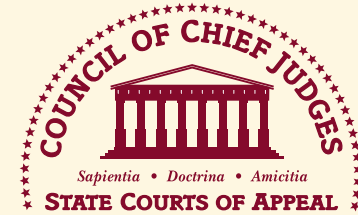
The hotel is located 5 minutes from the Raleigh-Durham International Airport. A cab ride costs approximately \$15.00 from the Raleigh-Durham International Airport to the hotel. An Uber ride costs approximately \$10.00 from the Raleigh-Durham International Airport to the hotel. The hotel does not provide a free shuttle service.

CLIMATE

The average temperatures in Cary in November are 63 degrees for a high and 41 degrees for a low. You may want to pack an umbrella just in case the area experiences precipitation.
