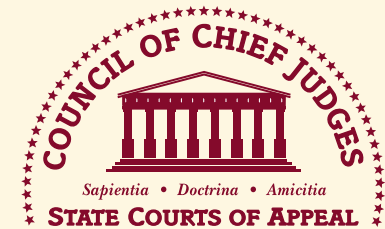

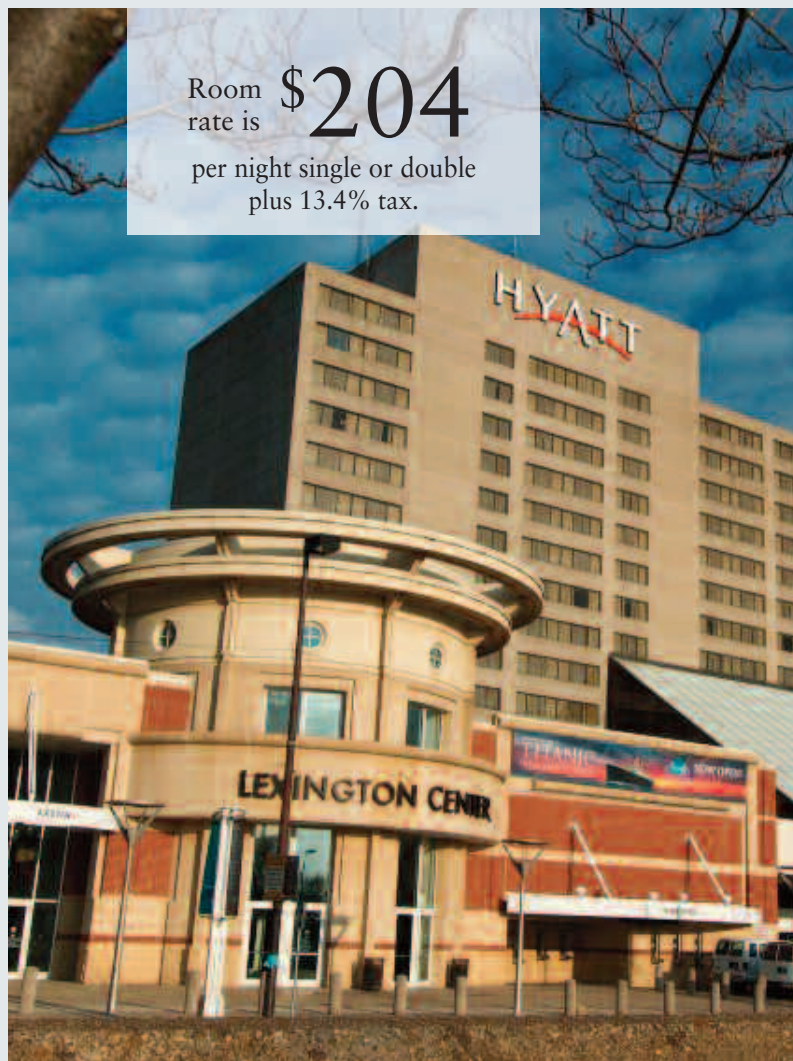

TRAVEL

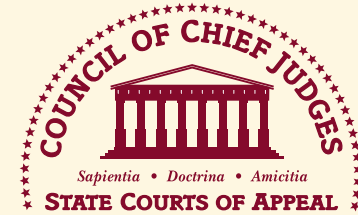
The hotel is located 6.2 miles from Lexington's Bluegrass Airport (LEX). A cab ride costs approximately \$20.00 one way to the hotel, while an Uber ride costs approximately \$15.00. The hotel does not provide a free shuttle service. Alternative airports include: Louisville, KY (SDF) or Cincinnati, OH (CVG), both 1.5 hours from the hotel.
