Who reads *The Journal of Appellate Practice and Process*?

Each issue of *The Journal* is mailed to over 2000 recipients, including the members of every state and federal appellate court in the United States, the members of the Supreme Court of Canada, and the hundreds of attorneys who belong to the American Bar Association's Council of Appellate Lawyers. It is also available in virtually every academic law library in this country and goes by subscription to many court libraries, including those of the Supreme Court of the United States, the High Court of Australia, and the High Court of New Zealand.

Do judges find *The Journal's* articles useful?

Over the past three years, *The Journal* has been cited more than 50 times in the written opinions of courts across the country—in Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, New Mexico, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Puerto Rico, and Utah.

Do scholars find *The Journal's* articles useful?

The Journal was cited over 250 times in more than 50 different law reviews and journals during the past three years. Those citations have appeared in publications associated with law schools in every region of the United States, from the University of Maine in the east to Loyola-Los Angeles in the west, and from Elon in the south to the University of Minnesota in the north.

Who is behind *The Journal*?

The Journal is sponsored by the faculty of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock William H. Bowen School of Law, where it was founded in 1999 to provide a forum for creative thought and dialogue about the operation of appellate courts and their influence on the development of the law. *The Journal's* [editorial board](#) includes five members of Bowen's teaching faculty and a professional editor.

How often does *The Journal* appear?

The Journal is published twice a year, typically in late May or early June and again in late November or early December. *The Journal's* [website](#) includes a link to past content, which includes full-text as-published copies of all but the two most recent issues. Online content is updated twice a year as each new issue is published.
