

Dress Code: Business Casual Guidelines

It is important for Court personnel to present a professional appearance at all times. We expect all of our personnel to adhere to the standards below and to exercise good judgment in selecting attire that is befitting the solemn work of our Court.

Personnel should be appropriately groomed, which includes clean hair, nails and teeth. Clothes should be clean and pressed. Make-up, if worn, should be appropriate for a professional business environment. Hair styles should be business-like, and hair should not hang in front of the eyes or otherwise be distracting.

There may be occasions when severe weather conditions require exceptions to our standards. We expect our personnel to use good judgment to dress appropriately for the circumstances on those occasions.
